Many of the people who come in are not regular patrons of the library. When they come to our sales, they have a chance to see what a lovely, welcoming place Acton is. Today, libraries are about much more than book lending. They are community gathering places that just happen to have a fantastic array of books that can be borrowed with a free library card. 



CALLIGRAPHY THAT INSPIRED A NATION (AMERICA 250 EVENT) Tuesday, February 17 at 6:00 p.m.




